PROJECT REACH

1.2 million people, more than 58% women and children under 5.

OUR GOAL

Improve the health of Afghans in three provinces, focusing on women of reproductive age and children under five.

OUR APPROACH

- Improving the quality of health facilities and expanding the reach and range of health services available in remote and rural areas, focusing on gender-related barriers to access and use of health services by women and girls.
- Increasing the availability of health human resources and investing in skills and knowledge of health workers, with a focus on nursing and midwifery.
- Mobilizing civil society and community engagement to support better governance and health-promoting behaviours, including hygiene, sanitation, and nutrition practices.
- Collaborating with health education and training institutions at the national level, and the Afghan Ministry of Public Health.



HIGHLIGHTED RESULTS



79 health facilities in remote areas rehabilitated to provide essential health care services, and the 140-bed Bamyan Provincial Hospital constructed.



2,900+ female and male national and provincial health workers received health-related training, including specialization in maternal and child health.



31,000+ children under two in remote areas provided with life-saving vaccines through mobile immunization clinics.



8,000+ farmers and their family members benefited from the introduction of nutritious crops to farmers' groups.



320+ graduates, majority women, from nursing and midwifery degree and diploma programs, increasing access to health care for women and girls.



815 water supply points constructed, improving health, sanitation, and hygiene by providing access to clean water for over 19,200 people.
