Guitar

The modern word 'guitar' is thought to have come from the Greek word *kithara*. According to Greek mythology, Greek gods Hermes or Apollo made the first kithara from a tortoise shell. It had three strings, but later versions had as many as 12 strings.

> Moors brought the oud to Southern Spain in early 700 AD. The lute passed from Ancient Egyptians to Greeks then Romans, who

brought it to Eu-

In the mid-1800s, Spanish guitar-maker Antonio de Torres Jurado created the modern style of guitars. He made a broad

body, thin belly, and a curve at the guitar's 'waist'. He replaced wooden tuning pegs with machine heads. Spanish guitarist Andres Segovia popularized Torres' guitar as a concert instrument.

Around the same time, Europeans made a steel-stringed version of the Spanish guitar. Flat-top acoustic guitars were created by American guitar-maker Christian Frederick Martin to make the guitar body strong enough to handle the heavier modern steel strings. Orville Gibson created the archtop guitar, which has greater volume and tone because of its adjustable bridge. Flat-top guitars are mostly played by jazz and country musicians. In 1931, partners George Beauchamp and Adolph Rickenbacker got the patent for an electric guitar.

After the electric guitar's invention, guitar-making companies worked on improvements to make the guitar body stronger.

They also introduced a wider range of sounds from the guitar, giving us the guitars we see and use today.



der a tree in the company of his pet. The shade provides a calm environment for reading. He enjoys a cool breeze as he reads. It is exciting to imagine Kazito listening to Musa as he reads a storybook.

Before long, Musa gives Kazito carrots. Kazito loves car-

rots. He is happy that Musa knows his favourite food. He eats carrots happily. Here, we learn that if we have a pet, it is our responsibility to feed and take care of it.

Optical eye glasses



The first reading aid was invented by an unknown inventor around 1000 A.D.. It was a circular clear stone with the capacity to magnify words when placed on top of a book. Readers would move the stone over the text to magnify whatever they wanted to read. It was like using a hand-held magnifying glass. In 1284, the first pair of weara-

ble glasses were invented by Italy's Salvino D'Armate. They however, lacked certain modern features such as the temples which are placed behind the ears to hold the glasses in place. Glass wearers would instead place the framed glasses on top of their nose bridge. Quite uncomfortable, right?

Since they couldn't walk around with them on their noses, these lenses, also known as scissor glasses had tiny holes on the frame such that it was possible to loop in strings, which would then be used

to hang them around the neck In 1600 A.D Spanish craftsmen started adding strings or ribbons of silk on to glass frames. The strings would them be looped behind the ears. However, in 1727, Edward Scarlet, invented the first eyeglass frame temples. They had curved hooks which rested on the back part of

In 17th century, glasses became more than magnifying tools. They started correcting distance sight problems such as short and long sightedness. Benjamin Frankin is believed to have invented the first bi-focal lenses which corrected both long and short sightedness. Bifocal lenses are those that possess the ability to correct two eye problems at the same time.

All this while, optical lenses were made of glass, but in 1936, William Feinbloom invented the first plastic lenses which are safer and still used

After that, optical eye glasses have improved significantly. They're able to correct more eye problems effectively and the frames have become more comfortable and fashionable.

Swimmer Clara hopes to compete internationally after Covid-19 pandemic

hen the Coronavirus pandemic was first announced in Kenya, many activities were put on hold including sports activities. For Clara Mbodze, 10, the outbreak of the disease affected her as she was working towards various international competitions that were to take place this year.

Clara, a pupil at Loreto Convent Mombasa loves swimming.

"This pandemic has denied me the chance to qualify and be selected to be part of the national team. But I will not give up, I will keep training until things get back to normal. I am hopeful that I will still be chosen to be part of the Kenvan team," said Clara.

Clara, who started swimming as a hobby says her Coach, Albert Oketch and her parents have been giving her support to ensure that she exploits her

Through their support, she has won more gold medals, than silver and bronze from the time she started getting into competitions.

She was only two years when she started training at The Sanana Club, Nvali every Saturday for fun until she joined nursery school at Loreto Convent Mombasa where she met Coach Albert.

The first ever competition she took part in was in 2016 where she emerged the best swimmer in the nursery category. Since then, Clara has been participating in races representing her school team as she works towards being the best swimmer at the Coast.

In the last five years since she started competing, Clara has bagged a total of 93 medals including 66 gold, 14 silver and 13 bronze, all from her participation in the popular Coast Amateur Swimming Association (CASA) champi-

Even though she has taken part in local races, Clara aspires to participate in more international races in Africa and the Olympics once she turns 13.

Clara hopes to be recognised as the Queen of Swimming" not only in the Coast region, but the best female diver in Kenya

To be best in her skill, she says her secret is to maintain discipline and she keenly follows instructions given to her by her Coach

Additionally, she said she learns some of the new skills very fast.

As schools remain shut, Clara does her training to improve on her skills in preparation for the races she hopes will resume soon.

She looks up to other female swimmers from Mombasa like Emily Muteti and Sylvia Brunlehner.


